The Effects of the Pandemic on Youth Mental Health



The 2021 Children's Mental Health Report from Child Mind Institute explores the effects of the pandemic on child and adolescent mental health, development and learning. To collect the data, Child Mind Institute asked parents to participate in surveys about their children's mental health. The report sought to answer key questions, including: "What do we know about how the pandemic has affected young people's mental health?" and "How can we reduce the mental health impacts of the next global public health crisis—and the remainder of this one?"

While we encourage you to read the full report when you have time, key findings and takeaways include:

- The youth who were most vulnerable to decreased mental health included: youth with autism, youth with a history of trauma or mental health disorders, youth from families faced with economic hardship and food instability, youth in urban areas and BIPOC youth.
- 70% of youth reported loneliness, irritability or fidgetiness and 55% of youth reported feeling sad or unhappy during the pandemic.
- Findings indicate that "efforts to support young people's mental health moving forward must address the specific stressors consistently reported by vulnerable groups."
